ALERT!

Τα επιρρήματα συχνότητας (adverbs of frequency) μπαίνουν πριν από το κύριο ρήμα, αλλά μετά από το ρήμα *to be*.

Present Continuous

at present, at the moment, now, right now, today, tonight, this week/month/year, next week/month/year, soon, tomorrow, always, forever
